# I. Monthly Activity Log

## II. General Exchange Information

### Visa Procedure

You need to have your letter of acceptance from Lund University before proceeding to the application for the resident permit in Sweden as a student. You can go to Swedish Migration Agency <https://www.migrationsverket.se/English/Private-individuals/Studying-in-Sweden/Universities-and-university-college/How-to-apply-for-the-first-time.html> to apply the permit online and pay the application fee. You will later be informed to visit the Consulate General of Sweden in Hong Kong in Wan Chai for submission of photograph, fingerprints and signature. You can get your permit from the consulate office within one week (in my case) after you complete all the above procedures (the time maybe vary so you do not have to be worry so much)!

### Orientation Activities

You should go to Lund website to get the Orientation week schedule. It lasted for more than 2 weeks in my semester. Some of them are compulsory activities such as pre-registration which you should be careful of the date, time and venue. Some activities like excursion days have quota and you are required to register in Lund on the arrival day (I advise you to arrive Lund earlier if you are really interested in those activities). Many other activities are held by student

nations (which is similar to our business cohort in UST but in a larger scale, not just for business students but for all) for you to meet other international students and get familiar with the living in Lund. You can join all kinds of activities, ranging from lunch/dinner gathering, quiz night, pub night and much more. Be open and don't be hesitate to join these activities to experience the foreign cultures as well as make new friends.

### **International services and activities**

### **Accommodation**

I lived in a studio flat at Ostra Torn which was offered by Lund Accommodation. Studio Flat is an apartment with private washroom, shower and kitchen. It is good that it offered high degree of privacy. However, you may find a bit difficult to get to know your neighbours and make friends because of lacking common area to socialize with each other. If you live there, I suggest you to be proactive to knock on your neighbours' doors and start conversation with them to build close relationships.

For business student, Ostra Torn may not be a good choice in terms of the location as it takes a bit long travel time to get to the major business building Ekonomihögskolan vid Lunds universitet (30 minutes walk or 10 minutes for bike). I suggest you to choose other option if you have poor time management. But still it is quite convenient to access to everywhere in Lund by bike.

There is usually shortage of housing in Lund. Even you apply the housing through Lund Accommodation (the biggest housing supplier



in Lund), you may still end up being put on the waiting list in the first round of offer. You should not worry so much when you are on waiting list. In order to secure the accommodation, **you must apply sharply at the time it opens for application**. You can also look for alternatives like AF Bostäder (you need to check the facilitates and terms offered carefully)!

### Course Registration

You can register courses one month before the term commences via student portal. Please check the emails from Lund for more details. You should check for the course details and the credit transfer requirement before you do the course registration. You can drop course within 2 weeks after the course starts. However, you should notify the LUSEM office as soon as possible if you wish to add new course(s) in replace of the dropped one(s). In LUSEM, student can normally select a maximum of 4 courses per semester. The following are the courses I studied:

1. FEKH92 Innovation Management
2. INFC40 Information Systems Security
3. STAE03 Business Analytics
4. SUSA11 Swedish: Introductory Course for Exchange

Students 1 (not counted in 4 subject quota)

### Teaching and assessment methods

Most of the subjects in Lund are absolute-grading. It does not necessary means it is easy to get a good grade (if it matters to you). All seminar lessons are compulsory to attend so you need to aware of those! Also you should check your class schedule on TimeEdit



regularly as it may be updated by your instructors during their teaching.

The assessment method of different courses may vary and some are very different from UST. For example, there was an oral examination in FEKH92 Innovation Management which required to answer instructors' questions face-to-face. In INFC40 Information Systems Security, the final examination was taken at home, meaning you can do the research not only freely but also extensively!!! These experience are unique that you can never experience in UST.

Lund University encourages students to do their self-study. That's why class attendance is not compulsory. But I never skip any classes as I enjoyed having open discussion in class with classmates and instructors.

### **Sport and Recreational Activities**

I went to the public sport stadium Victoria Stadium a few times for playing badminton (there are also basketball courts, gym room and more facilities). Advance booking and payment is required. You can continue to use the booked equipment and facility as long as no one using them. The cheapest way to exercise is having a run in town while enjoying the beautiful scenery of Sweden.

### **Finance and banking**

Normal exchange students staying for just 1 semester are not allowed to set up a local bank account in Sweden. The best way to finance you expense is to bring enough SEK. If you wish not to bring so much cash, you can apply a Visa plus card for cash withdrawn (you should contact your own bank for more details). All bank card with Unionpay logo is not valid in Swedish ATM machine!

In Sweden, you can enjoy cashless transaction with using credit cards or debit cards. There will be transaction fee charged with credit card payments. Remember to get the 6-digit password from your bank before using the credit cards (it maybe required in some transactions). Debit cards are not common in Hong Kong but not the case in Sweden. You can enjoy less transaction fee charged with debit card but you always required to enter the 4-digit password in each transaction.

### **Social clubs and networking opportunities**

Studentlund are like our student union in UST which provides activities and discounts for student. You will also be asked to join one of the student nations which like a cohort system but in a larger scale. Joining a nation does not mean you cannot join other activities held by other nations. Feel free to try the activities you like and socialise with both local and international students.

### **Health and Safety**

Sweden is one of the most safest country in the world. Since Lund is a university town, safety is not a much concern. Although every exchange students are covered by the university insurance, I strongly recommend you to buy a insurance that covers whole Europe for travelling purpose.

### **Food**

Eating out in Sweden costs a lot (around SEK80-150 for lunch and SEK 150-200 for dinner). Therefore, I chose to cook at home for cheaper, yet independent and fun purpose. It is not so expensive to buy food in local supermarkets. It would be more cheaper if you go to open market in Malmo. The weekly expense for food (cook at home) is around SEK400.

## **Transportation**

The public transport in Lund is expensive to me (single trip for bus costs SEK25-35). If you use the JOJO card (the local octopus card), you can enjoy 10% discount. I decided to buy the monthly student transport pass (monthly student JOJO card for Skane area costs SEK~650) in the first 2 month of study as the weather was not good for biking. Later I rented a second-hand bicycle for a monthly rent of SEK 300 which was a cheaper yet convenient option for me.

## **Climate**

The weather was not good in January and February in Lund as it snowed a lot and temperature is at around -10 to 0 degree celsius. It got better and better after March. The weather was extremely good, sunny and cool in May before I left.

## **Communication**

Communication is never a big problem in Sweden because the most locals speak proficient English and they are friendly for help. It is good you can speak basic Swedish to greet the locals.

## **Others reminders**

Please check the Lund email and UST email regularly as there may contain very important information!

Don't hesitate to ask if you have any questions! Do your own research before departure and plan your schedule carefully.

You should plan your travel in advance. In order to get cheaper tickets, you can search and book tickets at least one month in advance. For travelling in Sweden, if you are taking the National rail SJ, there maybe some last minute cheap youth tickets to purchase. But the availability and price are not known until last 24 hours before the train departs and there is usually quota on those tickets! Be cautious!

- Warm clothes
- Jackets (water and wind proof)
- Gloves, scarf
- Snow boots for winter and normal shoes for spring and summer
- A few cloth hangers (you can buy more in IKEA)
- Laptop and charger
- Portable charger for mobile phone
- Wifi router and cable



- Universal adaptors
- Backpack/ small suitcase for travel
- Skin care products (as it is usually dry in Sweden)
- Tower
  - Some food (for first night in case you don't have time to do the shopping on the first day in Lund)
