January

General Exchange Information

1. Visa Procedures

It is not necessary for you to apply a student visa to exchange to Canada. As Hong Kong is a visa-exempt country in Canada, you will only have to apply an online <u>eTA</u> if you have a valid Hong Kong passport and stay in Canada for less than 6 months. An eTA application costs for \$7 CAD and is paid online by credit card. A student visa is needed if you are going to work in Canada or stay for longer than 6-month period. For students who are going to the US, an US visa is needed. You are advised to apply an US visa at least one month before your departure because the procedure will take a long time

2. Orientation Activities

As mentioned above, a mandatory orientation day will hold before the semester starts. On that day, you will receive your Queen's student ID. Remember to bring your personal identification to verify your identity. The orientation day is a golden opportunity for you to meet other international students.

3. International Services & Activities

The Queen's University International Centre (QUIC) often provides a variety of activities to international students. If you are going to ski, you can borrow ski boots from QUIC with your student id card. The staff are friendly, and they will like to answer all your inquiry.

4. Accommodation

You have two options of housing. You can either choose to live on campus or off campus. Queen's University provides a building, Jean Royce Hall, for international students. It takes about 20 minutes to walk to school or a 5 minutes bus ride. The residential hall, in my opinion, is quite expensive. If you are looking for a more economical choice, you can rent a house outside. Facebook page, "Queen's University - Off-Campus Housing", is a platform for students to connect with house owners.

5. Courses Registration

The courses registration system is similar to UST's system. It is called SOLUS. You will be familiar with the registration procedure. Registration begins in December. You can contact the exchange coordinator if you have any problems with course registration. You can enroll maximum 15 credits.

6. Teaching & Assessment Methods

7. Sports & Recreation Facilities

You can do sports in the Athletics and Recreation Centre (ARC). There is a large gym area with many different types of facilities. There are also basketball court and swimming pool in the building You can find lockers in the changing room. However, you will have to bring your own lock. If you are going to buy one at there, it will cost for \$30 CAD.

9. Social Clubs & Networking Opportunities

As mentioned above, QUIC holds numbers of activities for international students throughout the semester. Do not miss those events if you wish to meet some international friends. Many societies and clubs in Queen's have their own Facebook page. You can send a message and ask for joining them if you are interested in them.

10. Health & Safety

A mandatory insurance plan offered by Queen's University, UHIP, cover your medication expense during your exchange study in Queen's. Remark that all accidents happened in your own travel or after the exchange study period, are not covered. The insurance plan costs CAD \$204.

11. Food

You can buy the school meal plan if you live in school's residence. With the meal plan, you can buy food in restaurants in Queen's University by using your student card. If you live off-campus, you can buy food from Metro or Food Basic and cook for yourself. It would cost much less than purchasing a meal plan. A wide variety of restaurants can be found on Princess Street. A main course usually cost for \$10 to \$15 CAD.

12. Transportation

Bus is the major transportation in Kingston. You can almost get to everywhere by bus. You can check the bus route and arriving time on Google Map. By showing your student id card, you can get on buses for free. For travelling to other cities like Toronto or Ottawa, you can take shuttle bus. There is a Tri-color outlet in Queen's University. They offer shuttle bus with discount price. It would be your choice if you have a tight travel budget.

13. Climate

The weather is unstable in January and February. The temperature was around -15C to -25C all the time. There was often heavy snowing. It would be best to not go out at night because of the extreme cold. If you have to go outside, you should check the weather before you go. Houses in Canada usually have furnace. Therefore, you do not have to dress a lot when you are indoor.

14. Communication

Phone plans in Canada are expensive. Plans with 2GB data often cost for \$80 CAD each month. all these companies are expensive in my opinion. A friend of mine bought 4 sim cards, that have 5GB network data in Hong Kong. It was cheaper that purchasing a phone plan. If you are staying in hall or school, Wi-Fi service will be provided.
