














EXCHANGE INFO.

1) Visa Procedures

The entire procedure takes about 1.5 month so make sure you reserve plenty of time. The exchange program director will tell you everything you need. Make sure to check clearly if there are any typos or wrong information once your visa documents are sent to UST SBM office by Cornell. You will then need to pay the SEVIS fee, fill in the online visa application form, and reserve an interview time slot with the US consulate. After the interview, you can pick up your passport there or in any SF Express deliver center. For my case, the passport was ready in 2 days. During the passport verification in orientation, you will obtain a travel signature on your DS-2019 form that allows you to travel outside the United States during your exchange semester.

2) Orientation Activities

From time to time you will receive emails about updates on orientation activities. If you are in CALS, there will constantly be mingling and fun activities for exchange students to know each other, like pizza night, bowling night etc.

3) International Services & Activities

You can always find help from the CALS exchange program office through email, in person, or through Facebook messaging the program director. There is also the International Students Office in charge of all activities.

4) Accommodations

I lived in university off-campus housing in Collegetown Terrace, where most international exchange students stayed. It is a luxurious hotel-like complex cooperatively run by external organization and Cornell. There are 2 rooms in each flat, an open kitchen, oven, 2 toilets, washing machine, dish washer basic stuff like bed and cupboards, and a wonderful gym. However, as it is off-campus, it doesn't come with the West Dining Hall meal plan. If I would go again, I would definitely apply for West Campus dorms, simply because the food there is extraordinary, and the cost covered food so it's much cheaper.

5) Course Registration

The course registration system is basically the same as UST's. You can just login to student centre and there you can register for classes. Just Google Cornell Course timetable and you can find the course catalog. You can always drop or swap classes during the first 2 weeks of school.

6) Finance & Banking (including currency / expenses)

I would recommend opening a bank account and deposit cash with one of the major retail banks once you arrived at the States, namely Bank of America, Chase Bank, or Credit Union. It is hard to give an accurate breakdown of my spending in the semester, and it would not be applicable to everyone too as everyone has different dining and spending habit, which also highly depends on your travelling schedule. In general, dining is more expensive than in HK – a meal costs \$6-10 on campus and over \$15 in restaurant (there is a ~9% tax and it is a courtesy to give >15% tips). There are also meal plan options that the International Students Office will send you.

7) Social Clubs & Networking Opportunities

There will be an Involvement Fair in the first week of class where you can know more about different clubs and societies on campus. For me, I joined the Glee Club, which is also the music course that I was taking. We have rehearsals every Wednesday nights and Sunday afternoons, and a few concerts over the semester. I also joined their spring tour to perform in 6 different states. Hong Kong Students Association is a good pick too.

8) Health & Safety

Medical cost in US is incredibly expensive, so all exchange students are required to purchase a health insurance (Julia will tell you more about that). That would cover most expenses at Cornell Health. Regarding to safety, Cornell is a really safe neighborhood so don't really worry about the safety here.

9) Food

There are many dining options on campus, mostly in dining halls. One of the favourite hobbies for me and my friends is to taste as many dining halls as possible. As there is an app about what food each dining hall is offered every day, it was always very exciting to bounce between dining halls. And that's why having a dorm in West Campus is very, very important.

10) Transportation

Public transportation system in Ithaca is not as well-developed as Hong Kong, but as an exchange student, you would be granted free TCAT bus services. Other than that Uber and Lyft can take you anywhere in Ithaca. But outside Ithaca, if you want to travel, try Zimride, it's a rideshare platform of the Cornell community. You may be able to find drivers going to NYC, Boston, Washington D.C., or even Toronto depends on your luck. Otherwise, Ourbus is the best way to travel to NYC, 4.5 hours ride.

11) Climate

It literally snowed 80% of the days, so be prepared about the chilly weather.

12) Communication

There are several huge telecommunication network providers you can choose from, such as AT&T, Verizon or T-mobile. However, T-mobile offers a better coverage in NY and major cities, with family plan which significantly lowers the cost if you register an account with several friends. However, in rural areas such as Yosemite National Park the reception is very bad. There is Wi-fi everywhere on campus but the connection is often so bad I had to use my data to complete online assignments.

13) What to bring

- Passport, DS-2019 form (and copies of them)
- Business suits
- Electrical adaptors
- Personal laptop, camera
- Sunglasses and hats
- Swimsuits and thicker clothing (for travelling to colder areas)
- Money (you can always buy things you forget to bring)
