



Exchange report Spring 2018 – Lund University, Sweden

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Part 1 Monthly activity log

January





I arrived Copenhagen Airport with other buddies on 8th June and spent a night in the airport. Lund University had sent out plenty of student helpers to pick us up at the airport on the next day and led us to the registration venue and our accommodation. I spent my first week in Lund to settle down and involve in different orientation activities like the treasure hunt and language cafe. Subsequently, my buddies and I spent our time to explore some regions nearby including Malmo and Copenhagen. Additionally, I attended the Swedish Introductory Course in the first three weeks and it was a fun and fruitful course.

February

Part 2 General exchange information

Visa procedures

It is a must to apply for a residence permit in order to stay more than three months in Sweden. The application process roughly takes one and half month so it is better to apply for it as soon as possible once you get the Letter of Acceptance.

Orientation activities

Orientation activities in Lund University last for two whole weeks. Most of them are free of charge on a first come first served basis while some of them charge entry fee. In addition, all exchange students will be assigned to a mentor group and participate in the Treasure Hunt.

International services & activities

If you are looking for a fruitful international student life, International desk will be a good place to start with. International desk holds networking activities for all international students from time to time and the activities are mostly free of charge. Language cafe will be another wise option if you want to mingle with people from all over the world and learn some new languages.

Accommodations

Lund Accommodation will be a good starting point to search for an accommodation. However, it does not guarantee for any housing space so it is always better to apply as soon as possible. An alternative source will be AF Bostäder if you fail to secure a housing space in the first round of application. Additionally, you can also find accommodation from other housing agencies.

Courses registration

Exchange students can take up to four courses at most at Lund University, two in the first period and two in the second period. In addition, it is optional to enroll in the Swedish introductory course at the beginning of the semester. I had taken the following courses:

SUSA 11 Swedish: Introductory Course for Exchange Students 1

FEKH 11 Business Policy

FEKH 92 Business Administration: Innovation Management

SASH 26 Diversity of the World's Languages

Teaching & assessment methods

At Lund University, attendance are only compulsory for the first lesson of each course. Lund University adapts absolute grading and it is a must to get a pass in every assessment to pass the course. Additionally, students are expected to read assigned readings before every lecture. Examinations are taken in three forms: oral, written and take home exam. Most importantly, the schedule of courses at Lund University are usually irregular so you should check the schedule and venue regularly.

Sports & recreation facilities

Victoria Stadium is a good place for doing sports. The membership fee of the gym room for half year is around SEK500.

Finance & banking (including currency/expenses)

Sweden Krona is the official currency of Sweden. However, the use of credit card is more preferable and convenient.

Social clubs & networking opportunities

If you would like to make friends from Sweden and all over the world, you should join a nation. Lund University has 13 nations in total and each of them has their own features and atmosphere. Language cafe is also a good place to mingle with international students and learn new languages.

Health & safety

HKUST and Lund University have purchased insurance for exchange students respectively. However, it is better to purchase an extra international insurance to further secure yourself. Lund is safe city as it is a university town.

Food

Eating outside is relatively expensive in Lund and each meal is around SEK100. As a result, I usually cooked my own meal and the price of each meal was around SEK40. If you are bored with pasta and burger, you can try out the Japanese and Thai restaurants in Lund and they can be easily found.

Transportation

Cycling is a common practice in Lund. An alternative option will be taking the public transportations which cost more than SEK20 per trip. You can pay for the transportation by using a 'Jojo card' or buying tickets through an application called 'Skanetrafiken'.

Climate

From January to March, the weather in Lund is around -2°C to 6°C, the whole city is covered by snow and there will be snowfall occasionally. Lund starts to be warmer in April and Spring lands on Lund in May. The humidity in Lund is quite low so it is better to bring along face and skin moisturizers.

Communication

Most of the people living in the Scandinavia region (including Sweden) can speak fluent English and they are mostly welcome to use English to communicate. If you take the Swedish introductory course, you will be able to understand basic Swedish and read the signs in the supermarket.

Cautionary measures

Lund is an extremely safe city and there is no big safety issue. However, it is better to stay alert when you walk on the street at midnight.
