# Part 1 – Monthly Activity Log

### February 2018

You might think curling is just about sweeping the floor or sliding rocks to the other side because I did think so before I had this wonderful curling experience. ### April 2018

# Part 2 – General Exchange Information

### 1. Visa Procedures

Hong Kong is a visa-exempt country in Canada. If you have a valid passport from Hong Kong and stay in Canada for less than 6 months, it is not necessary to apply for a visa. Instead, you need to apply online for an **eTA**. Each application costs \$7 CAD. If you want to work in Canada, you have to apply for a student visa. If you are planning to go to the US, an US visa is needed. The process of US visa application will take a long time. It is better to apply as least one month before your departure.

#### 2. Orientation Activities

There will be a mandatory orientation day before the semester starts. You will collect your Queen's student ID. Personal identification is needed to verify your identity. There are welcoming talk, academic talk and campus tour. Apart from that, there is a counter for setting up Canadian bank account.

### 3. International Services & Activities

The ice-curling activity, trip to maple syrup farm and a farewell party for exchange students were held by The Centre of International Management. The Queen's University International Centre (QUIC) also offers a variety of activities for International students, such as international food exchange, English conversation group, movie sessions and trips.

#### 4. Accommodations

For housing, you can either choose on campus or off campus. Queen's university provides residential hall to international students, but it is quite expensive. If you are looking for a more economical choice, you can rent a house with locals or other exchange students.

### 5. Courses Registration

Queen's courses registration system is called "SOLUS" which is similar to UST's SIS system. Course registration procedure is almost the same as how you do it in UST. Course registration will take place in December. Students can enroll up to 12-15 credits in one semester. If you are going to take COMM 401, you will have to find the UST Business School to write a letter for you certifying that COMM 414 is your major required course.

### 9. Social Clubs & Networking Opportunities

As mentioned above, QUIC is a department serving international students. It organizes a lot of activities throughout the semester. You can follow their facebook page to keep an eye on their coming events. I think English conversation group is one of the best weekly activities you can go to since you can play games or chat with locals and other international students every week.

### 10. Health & Safety

You are required to purchase an insurance plan offered by Queen's, named UHIP. It costs CAD \$204. It will only cover your study in Kingston. It does not cover your trip outside Kingston and expire after your study period is completed.

#### 11. Food

Queen's offer a meal plan. If you purchase a meal plan, you can have your meal at Queen's specified restaurants by using your student card. If you want to eat outside, Princess Street will be your choice. A lots of restaurants are located on that street. A lunch normally costs for CAD \$10-15 and a dinner costs for CAD \$20-25. I recommend to cook for yourself since it is much economical and you can have more budget for travel.

#### 12. Transportation

In Kingston, you can take bus to almost everywhere. By presenting your student id card, you can take buses for free. If you are travelling to cities outside Kingston, such as Toronto or Montreal. You can either take train (VIA) or shuttle bus (Megabus or Greyhound). Taking train will have a shorter travelling time but a higher price. For shuttle bus ticket, you can get it from Tri-color outlet where it is located John Deutsch University Centre, Queen's University.

### 13. Climate

Kingston is cold from January to March. It is around -20 to 0 degree Celsius. Sometimes, it will even get down to -30 degree. You are advised to check the weather before you go outside as the weather can very unstable. You should wear waterproof coat and pant as they have strong heat-trapping function. Snow and ice on the road can be dangerous, you should also wear waterproof shoes.

#### 14. Communication

There are 3 major telecommunicate companies in Canada. The phone plans with mobile network for all these companies are expensive in my opinion. I suggest that you can buy 4 30-days mobile sim card before you go on exchange because phone cards are cheaper and have more data. Queen's and many restaurants provide Wi-Fi service.
