December



PART 2 - GENERAL EXCHANGE INFORMATION

1) Visa Procedures

If you do not hold Canadian passport, you are required to apply for an eTA (electronic travelling authorization) at http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/visit/eta-start.asp to enter Canada. It costs \$7 CAD and valid for 5 years. The application process is fast and applicants can obtain approval in several days.

Student visa is not required if you do not stay over 6 months, so I did not apply one.

2) Orientation Activities

There was a mandatory orientation for commerce exchange students organized by the Smith School of Business on 4th Sep. We attended talks, had lunch together and did a city hunt.

3) International Services & Activities

Queen's University International Centre (QUIC) offers a list of free/ priced activities, such as day tours, pumpkin picking/ corn maze etc. You would get to know more about Canada and meet other international students.

4) Accommodations

I joined a housing group ran by Queen's student on Facebook – 'Queen's University – Off-Campus Housing' and posted a request looking for a 4-month residence. It was really hard to find a short-term lease as landlords usually preferred a long lease. An exchange student from China saw my post and contacted me. She later invited me to a housing group on Wechat and met the landlord who was willing to do a 4-month lease. The house was located near Kingston Centre (a mall with grocery stores, restaurant, bank etc) and it was 15-20mins bus away from Smith school.

It is always good to look for residence as early as you can!

5) Courses Registration

The registration system is called 'SOLUS' with features and functions that are very similar to UST SIS system. Queen's do not have waiting list. If you wish to enrol in that course which was 'full', you may first approach the professor for approval and then your exchange advisor(s) for enrolment as they are the SOLUS administrator.

Exchange students are required to take at least 3 but no more than 5 courses per semester.

7) Sports & Recreation Facilities

Queen's students can use the sports facilities at Athletics & Recreation Centre (ARC) for free. They have gym, swimming pool, basketball court, badminton court etc.

9) Social Clubs & Networking Opportunities

There are a multitude of social clubs and societies at Queen's. You may search online and most of them have a Facebook page. Some of the clubs would hold booths in the open area at Smith School.

10) Health & Safety

You are required to purchase a health insurance (CAD208).

I had a night class every Wednesday till 9:30pm but I felt safe walking from campus to the bus stop. There are also blue lights emergency phones on campus where you could seek help by pressing the button. They also provide walk home service.

11) Food

There are several supermarkets in Kingston and I usually went to Loblaws which is close to my residence and Metro which is near campus at downtown. The former offered Queen's student 10% off student discount every Tue while latter every Tue/ Thu.

There are some fast food choices on campus, e.g. Tim Hortons, Teriyaki, Pita Pit etc.

There are also some authentic restaurants in downtown in case you miss Asian food: Japanese, Korean and Chinese.

12) Transportation

Queen's students are eligible to ride on all buses by Kingston Transit for free by showing Queen's student card.

If you would like to go out of town (e.g. Toronto, Montreal, Quebec etc), there are several ways:

- Megabus
- Viarail (more expensive)
- RIDESHARE Queen's University (a Facebook group where you can offer/ ask for a ride)

13) Climate

Since I reached Canada in late August, the weather is still hot at around 25 degrees, you may want to bring T-shirts and shorts. In late Sep/ Oct, it was breezier and rainier, it would be great if you have a waterproof jacket. Students here seldom bring umbrella. In mid/late Nov, I had my first snow and the temperature could get to -5 degree Celsius, so get your winter jacket ready by then. In Dec, Kingston would be snowier and colder.

14) Communication

All classes were conducted in English. My classmates usually used Facebook to communicate and for group projects.
