
Exchange Report Rutgers University, USA



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Part 1 Monthly Activity Log

September

There were a lot of things that you had to settle down in the first month. I arrived Newark Airport on 26th August and checked in my dorm at the same day. Stuff gave me the room key and temporary resident card which we had to return it after we got the student ID. After from that, I re-arranged my time-table by the help of the Global Exchange Office (GEO) in Rutgers before the semester actually started which was on 4th September and toke the vaccine to meet the immunization requirement. Part 2 General Exchange Information

1) Visa Procedures

The J-1 Visa, DS-2019, would be provided by the SBM office and you need to pay for the application fee. At the same time, you would also need to pay the SEVIS fee online. After all these, you now could schedule and appoint interview with the US Embassy. The interview is a causal talk with the Officer to confirm your background and the intention behind of going to the US. After that, your passport will be taken away for 2 weeks.

2) Orientation Activities

Rutgers will offer a series of orientation activities for the newcomers, both freshmen and exchange students. For Global Exchange Office, which mainly deal with exchange students, will organized same tea gathering and cultural sharing sessions for us to get along with each others. The Rutgers Students' Office, at the same time, will

have welcome ceremony, talks regarding transportation, working visa and club and society affairs for us to integrate into the RU community.

3) International Services and Activities

The Global Exchange Office is responsible to take care of exchange students. You can reach them simply by walking in or email. As I mentioned, cultural exchange session, buddy program, tea gathering would be offered.

4) Accommodations

There are a lot of accommodation in Rutgers across 4 different campuses. Imagine Rutgers University in New Brunswick is AT LEAST 5 times bigger than HKUST. I believe the Easton Avenue Apartment in College Avenue campus is the best with the perfect community where there is supermarket (with 3 minutes of walk), train station (with 2 minutes of walk), café, restaurants etc. To my own knowledge, the resident office would automatically assign a dorm for students. For exchange students like us, most of the time, we would be assigned to Easton Ave. Apartment.

6) Teaching & Assessment Methods

Teaching and Assessment Methods vary between subject to subject as well as professor to professor. Indeed, one thing that I would like to figure out is that the professors in Rutgers are not as straight as the professors in HKUST. Students can always negotiate and raise there concern and difficulties to the professors. They are willing to help as well. The materials covered are general easy to learn and the exams including midterms and finals are straight forward. Some of the courses will tend to do absolute grading, for example, my Econometrics, Laws and Economics and Logic classes.

7) Sports and Recreation Facilities

There is fitness center everywhere in the campus for students. I lived in Easton Avenue Apartment where I could hit the gym room easily. There are also swimming pools, basketball courts (indoor and outdoor) and badminton courts for students. If you are keen to workout, there are a lots of FREE training courses that you can JUST WALK IN and join, for example, Body Pump, HIIT training, Yoga sessions taught by trainers. All these information, from the training classes to the opening hour of every gym room, you could find it simply by download RU Recreation App.

9) Networking Opportunities

There are a lot of students' societies in fall semester. During the start of the semester, all the students' societies would gather in the main street in College Avenue to recruit new members. It is similar to the promotion period in the HKUST. I joined the Badminton Club and went to play for several times. For career development, there was a on-campus job application talk where Rutgers was trying to recruit students in helping the school.

10) Health and Safety

Health insurance is mandatory for all students in Rutgers, there is a health center in every campus. I brought some medicines from Hong Kong for emergence usage. Talking about safety, general speaking, Rutgers has a quite good community but bear in mind, DO NOT go into the downtown New Brunswick at night because even the local said it was a dangerous move. Apart from that, the problem of homeless is acceptable in Rutgers where they would come to you and beg for money, what you need to do is simply ignore them.

11) Food

The food in the US is quite expansive and so does the meal plan. I personally do not recommend buying the meal plan offered by the school, so what you need to do is drop the meal plan payment from your term fee. As the supermarket is nearby, I highly suggest you cook your own food. There are also a lot of good restaurants near the Easton Ave. and you might take a Uber to Edison to Hmart (Korean supermarket) and there are also some Chinese restaurant you can find. My favorite is the Spicy-24 in Edison.

12) Transportation

Rutgers provides shuttle buses from different campuses for FREE so you can save a lot from going to one campus to another. Simply download the Rutgers App to see the real-time schedule of the buses of each route.

Travelling to NYC and Philly are very convenient as well, 1 hour of train or bus to NYC and 2 hour of train to Philly. It costs US 35 for the round trip ticket to NYC. There is also a discounted ticket in student activity center which is only US 17.

13) Climate

September – October (10-19 degree Celsius)

October – December (-5 – 15 degree Celsius)

The weather in New Brunswick, New Jersey varies a lot and is extremely DRY, so be prepared.

14) Communication

English is the first language. Another language that I heard most of the time would be Spanish.

15) Cautionary Measures

Homeless issue is pretty serious in the United States. You would expect to see them near Rutgers' community. Rutgers would have an email alert to inform their students

about the crime happened near its neighborhood. Also, as mentioned early, DO NOT go to downtown New Brunswick at night.
