

Part I Monthly Activity Log

September 2018

Getting new starts at a totally new environment with full of excitement, I joined the orientation day organised by the school during my first week of arrival. This activity allowed us to get familiar with the campus through the campus tour as well as got to know all of the exchange students and staffs of school in the networking session.

In order to pursue convenience, I have purchased the VIA Rail unlimited student pass which could allow me to travel to Toronto and other cities in Windsor with certain block-out dates. At the beginning of October, I have joined Bus Trip to Ottawa as well as Local Corn Maze Bus Trip organised by Queen's University International Centre (QUIC). There are two important festivals celebrated in this month, including Homecoming and Halloween. Unfortunately, I did not have the chance to experience the scene of bustle and excitement during the weekend of Homecoming as I traveled to Montreal and Quebec at that time. I strongly recommend these two places as the scenery there was magnificent. Moreover, I also visited a few famous tourist attractions in Toronto, including CN Tower, Toronto Zoo, Royal Ontario Museum, Ripley's Aquarium of Canada and Casa Loma. It is more affordable to buy the Toronto CityPASS if you would like to travel all these spots. Another highlight in this month was a two-day trip to Niagara Falls. There were no words that I could describe how spectacular it was. Finally, I also took the Thousand Islands Cruise in Kingston during the reading week. Again, the scenery was stunningly beautiful.



November 2018

Part 2

General Exchange Information

1) Visa Procedures

It is not required to apply for a visa for studying less than 6 months in Canada if you are a Hong Kong Permanent resident with a valid passport. However, you must apply for an eTA (electronic traveling authorisation) to enter Canada. It costs \$7 CAD to get an eTA and only takes a few minutes to apply online. Approved eTAs are valid for up to five years. You can also apply for the US visa if you would like to travel to the United States during the exchange.

2) Orientation Activities

There is an Orientation on the first week of September organised by Smith School of Business to help students learn about the university and Kingston. It is mandatory to attend the orientation and you can take this opportunity to know the local students as well as other exchange students there.

3) International Services & Activities

The Queen's University International Centre (QUIC) offers support for international students and organises several bus trips during the semester with affordable price. The bus trips include traveling to Ottawa, Montreal as well as Niagara Falls. You can also join the corn maze and buy pumpkins there.

4) Accommodations

The hall spaces are extremely limited in Queens. Most of the exchange students failed to apply for the hall successfully and forced to find accommodations by themselves. It is particularly difficult renting housing by only 4 months as most of the leaser will only consider to rent for half or one year. As I did not have other better options, I chose to rent Airbnb for 4 months instead. The price was relatively the same when comparing with other off-campus accommodations, which was much cheaper than living in the campus.

5) Courses Registration

The course registration system (SOLUS) is mostly the same as the SIS system using by HKUST. All exchange students are required to take at least three courses and no more than 5 courses in total. Bear in mind that at least you should register two business courses. Besides, there are many prerequisites for certain business courses, you are required to submit the online application in August or even gain the supporting letter from HKUST for approval and also processing purpose.

7) Sports & Recreation Facilities

You can go to the Athletics & Recreation Centre (ARC) for sports, which is totally free of change and simply access by your student ID card. It is a four-story building with gym facilities, basketball courts and an indoor swimming room.

8) Banking

I suggest you can open a bank account for a debit card as it's more convenient when paying and can avoid carrying around a lot of loose change. It can also allow you to do online shopping as well.

10) Health & Safety

It is to necessary pay for UHIP (University Health Insurance Plan) insurance plan which costs CAD 204. It provides primary medical coverage for most doctor and hospital services in Ontario and you are required to pay before your exchange. In order to protect your safety at night, Queens also provides walk-home service which is totally free of charge.

11) Food

There are several supermarkets in Kingston. Metro is the nearest supermarket from campus which only needs around 10 minutes walk. You are able to get 10% discount on every Tuesday and Thursday by presenting your student card. There are few Asian groceries stores and Chinese restaurants downtown as well if you miss Chinese food you might want to check them out.

12) Transportation

It is free of charge to take any bus in Kingston as long as showing your student card. To get to or leave Kingston, you may check out MegaBus and Greyhound which offer cheaper tickets if you book a month in advance or purchase for student tickets. You can also take ViaRail if you have enough budgets.

13) Climate

During summer time in early September, it was quite warm at the beginning and you could simply wear T-shirts as the average temperature is around 20 °C. However, when it came to a few weeks later, the temperature began to drop down to around 10 °C, it is therefore not necessary to bring too many summer clothes for exchange in Fall Semester. Snow came in late October when temperature further dropped down to below 0 °C. It is actually quite cold in November and December, make sure you bring the essential clothing for heavy winter.

14) Communication

All of the courses in Queens are conducted in English and it is easy to understand Canadian English. Most of the local students in Queens use Facebook to communicate. Although there is wifi everywhere in the school area, I still choose to pay for the phone data plan as it is more convenient when traveling.
