February

Therefore, I traveled to Scandinavia from 2 Mar to 17 Mar. I went to Finland, Sweden, Norway and Iceland with my friends and for the first in forever we saw the aurora. At the end of March, I went to my Neverland Disneyland which is composed of two theme parks, Walt

Disney Studios and Disneyland Paris. I spent only 1 day in two parks with my friends and the park closed at 8 pm at that time which was quite early. Honestly speaking, it's better to two days here, focusing on only one park per day.



GENERAL EXCHANGE INFORMATION

Visa Procedures

Visa can be applied for three months before your departure in Hong Kong. Before submitting all your documents, you need to make an appointment for the academic interview. The interviewer may ask you some basic questions and so don't be nervous. After you pass the academic interview, you can have another reservation for the document submission.

Orientation Activities

The orientation session on the first day is compulsory for the exchange students. You will get your own student id card and have a lunch with all the exchange students on that day. Apart from that, you can opt to join some activities, such as visiting Paris on a riverboat cruise on the Seine River, held by student clubs.

International Services & Activities

There is an international association called MELT at ESSEC. They will organize some events during your stay such as visits of Paris, international dinners, bar crawls and even trips to discover the French cultural heritage, so that you can meet people from all horizons and discover France beyond Paris.

Accommodation

There are four residences for ESSEC students, but as a non-year-one exchange student, you can only choose from Les Linandes, Les Hauts

de Cergy and Le Port. I lived in a double studio in Les Hauts de Cergy which is 10 minutes by RER A, a kind of train in Paris, from the campus. A The rents should be paid on a monthly basis. Housing subsidy (APL) can be applied for based on your visa type. If you have a visa with the wording "dispense temporaire de carte de séjour" you will not get the housing subsidy. In addition, you need to pay for the WIFI in the residence.

Course Registration

There are two rounds of course registration before semester starts. Remember to check your ESSEC email as you will receive all the information from the school. For those who want to take the French language classes, you will have to take an online evaluation to determine which French class is the most suitable for you.

Teaching & Assessment Methods

I took four courses in total: Cash Management, Innovative Merchandising, Lower Intermediate French and Financial Markets.

For Cash Management, we had group homework every week and had one midterm, one final, and a final group project.

For Innovative Merchandising, sometimes we had classes in the central Paris to see how different brands marketed. For example, we've been to les Champs-Elysees and Le Bon Marche for class. We needed to submit a group report after each visit and had one final group presentation for this course.

For Lower Intermediate French, we had two quizzes and one group presentation during class. We had listening, oral and written tests for the final.

For Financial Markets, we had classes every two weeks and the class lasted for 6 hours. We had one midterm and one group presentation for the final.

Sports & Recreation Facilities

There is a gym and an indoor sport hall for playing badminton or soccer on campus. In addition, as far as I know, there's another gym at Les Hauts de Cergy.

Finance & Banking

The currency used here is euro. I only bring 500 euros and I didn't register for the local bank account. Most of the time I paid by credit card since I didn't want to bring so many cash. There's a bank BNP Paribas 5 minutes' walk from campus if you are really in need of cash.

Social Clubs & Networking Opportunities

You can always find networking events from your ESSEC email and some other social media. There's a pub on campus so that you can have a drink with your friends after class.

Health & Safety

Be careful of pickpockets in Paris as well as your journey. I didn't encounter any theft in Paris, but I did in Copenhagen and Barcelona and one of my friends lost her iPhone when taking the elevator in Paris.

Food

I usually cooked for myself when I had classes since there's only one cafeteria on campus. If you have time, it's good to try some French dishes and desserts in Paris.

Transportation

You will take the RER A as well as the metro very frequently in Paris so it's convenient to buy a Navigo transportation card which costs 75.2 euros per month. With the card, you can take most public transports in Paris.

Climate

The climate in Paris is not so bad although it rains sometimes. The weather in February and March is still cold and it is hot after late April. So, remember to bring clothes for both winter and summer.

Communication

People's English is not good in Cergy. Most of them cannot understand and speak English. It's better to take some basic French courses before you come to ESSEC for exchange.

Cautionary Measures

Take care of your personal belongings especially the wallet and the passport. Protect yourself when you go to crowded places.
