
Part I. Monthly log






<u>September</u>



London. After the trip, I returned to Lund on 31 Dec where there was firework all night for New Year celebration.






<u>January</u>

Though both of the courses that I selected finished lecture, there were still take-home examination and present in the mid of January. Therefore, I took my laptop with me to go a two weeks long trip to Barcelona, Sevilla and Venice. The southern part of Europe was so different from that of the northern

Europe, people there were very energetic and out-going. Also, the weather was always sunny with long daylight which was very similar to that of Hong Kong in the winter. Barcelona had a lot of tasty seafood tapas, while Sevilla had meat tapas, which they were both worth a try. In Sevilla, I visited Plaza de toros de la Real Maestranza which enriched my knowledge about bullfighting history in Spain. After the trip, I went back to Lund and began the preparation for the presentation for INFC 60 – IS Sourcing, it was a heavy workload course that required a lot of presentation and preparation before lessons.



Part II. General Exchange Information

Visa Procedures

As the visa application took around 3 months, it is recommended to start the visa application once accepted the offer. Financial documents offer letter and a short essay on the reason of applying the visa were required in the application process. For my case, it took around one and a half month before I receive the approvement from the embassy. Since Hong Kong embassy no longer serve the fingerprint collection process, therefore, Hong Kong citizens were allowed to do the following process after arriving in Sweden in a month. Since the time slot for fingerprint collection was quite limited, it was recommended to book in advance as soon as possible. One week after the appointment, the resident permit would be sent to the registered address by post. All in all, it was suggested to bring the visa acceptance letter with you when arriving in Copenhagen.

Orientation Activities

The orientation week took around 2 weeks. Exchange students could join the non-mandatory Swedish Introductory course, I certainly would recommend it since it helped me in my daily life, especially while doing grocery. The course content was relatively easy and fun to learn, I have learnt something about Swedish culture through watching Swedish film and enjoying Swedish music and literature. At the course end, students would have an exam with only 40-50 MCQs which were relatively straight forward. Also, the international desk organized some activities like hiking, tasting Swedish food and IKEA tour. It was highly recommended to go for the tasting Swedish food activity which you could have a try on some strange Swedish traditional food, such as liquorice.

International Services & Activities

Most of the international services were organized by Lund International desk, however, there were also some international activities offered by ESN. Students could join ESN during the orientation week, it offered several trips to different places, like Lapland in Finland. Other activities were organized by nations, students were required to join at least one nation in order to create their student card. Each nation had their own club, the major part of Lund student life was going to a night club.

Accommodations

Finding an accommodation was one of the most challenging things to do before the exchange began. There was a very low chance of getting a housing from LU Accommodation, students were recommended to find a housing from AF Bostader. In case of failure in searching for a housing, students could reach the Lund International office for help. They might offer temporary housing in Lund University Guest house, and a fast-track in LU Accommodation or other housing agencies. I lived in a corridor room in Sparta, where I made some international friends and had a great time.

Courses Registration

As soon as you received the acceptance letter, Lund University would send an email to inform students to fill in the course registration form online. Usually, it is recommended to take 2 courses per period. Around 1 months before exchange, you would receive a confirmation email of course registered. At this moment, you needed to check the class schedule online via TimeEdit to verify that there was no class conflict greater than 3 instances. If no class conflict appeared, you need to confirm your course choices as stated in the email. On the contrary, if conflict appeared, you need to inform the International Office to change courses. In case of anything happen when you arrived in Lund, you could still seek help from the International office to seek approval for course changes. The courses I took were as follow:

Teaching & Assessment Methods

Introductory lecture and seminar were compulsory, other lectures did not take attendance. If students were absent in seminar, some professor might request students to submit an additional work to compensate. Not all courses require examination, some courses might only have group paper and presentation. The mode of examination might be taken place in either examination hall or take-home exam.

Sports & Recreation Facilities

There were free yoga lesson every Thursday in AF Building. However, since it was on a first-come-first-serve basis, it is recommended to go to the venue at least 20 minutes before. Students could also apply for a gym membership in Sparta's private gym room.

Finance & Banking

Most of the European countries are relatively cashless, people usually just use credit cards, so it is better to bring around 3 credit cards with you. Lund also receive cash, however, not all shops do accept. Therefore, it is recommended to bring around 15,000 Swedish Krona and a few Euro.

Social Clubs & Networking Opportunities

There were nations and other interest clubs which students could join in the orientation week. Most of the membership was free, except ESN.

Health & Safety

It was extremely difficult to consult a doctor or dentist in Sweden, thereby, personal healthcare control is very essential. It was highly recommended to bring sufficient medicine with you. Also, taking some supplements would be a good idea to stay healthy. Lund was generally quite safe, however, it was important to keep in mind to lock the door and windows at all time. Since there was an instance that one of my dormmates' was being broken into and stolen personal belongings.

Food

Dining out in Lund is relatively expensive compared to that of Hong Kong. It is usually at around 150kr per person. However, there is a great pizza place in Lund called La Cucina which worth a try. Cooking in the dorm might be a better and cheaper choice. The goods in supermarket was 20% slightly more expensive than that of Hong Kong in average.

<u>Transportation</u>

Major transportations in Lund are bus and train. Most of the locals will buy a bike to commute to and from. A second-hand bike costs at around 700kr, while bus ticket costs around 20kr per trip and 40kr for a one-day pass. There is also monthly bus ticket. Walking might be the most common way to commute in Lund.

Climate

Weather in August to October is quite warm from around 24 to 12 Degree Celsius. It gets colder starting from the mid October and coldest in January at around -1 to 8 Degree Celsius. Since the indoor area is perfectly heated, hence, it was not difficult to adapt to the weather. All in all, it is recommended to bring a few summer clothes and mostly winter clothes with you.

Communication

On the registration day, students could buy a sim card from Telenor which could be topped up every month from 119 5GB to 199 10GB and more. The sim card enable user to dial calls and internet connection in all European countries, except Switzerland. The medium of communication in Sweden is mainly in Swedish and English.

<u>Cautionary measures</u>

Most of the time when going for a trip, I would go to Copenhagen airport. Custom might get on board to check the personal details while crossing from Denmark to Sweden via Oresund bridge. Bringing the passport and residence permit with you at all time was very crucial while living in Lund.
