GENERAL EXCHANGE INFORMATION

1 VISA PROCEDURES

As a Hong Kong Permanent Resident, a **Long Stay Student Visa (VLS-TS)** is required to stay in France for more than three months. Here are the steps to apply for a French student visa in Hong Kong:

- 1) Book a 15-minute academic interview with Campus France Office
 - > The purpose of the interview is mainly to understand the reason of studying in France and the level of understanding in French culture
- 2) Book an appointment at the visa section of Consulate General of France in Hong Kong to submit visa application and required documents

The visa application fee (discounted) was HKD422, along with a visa tourist tax of EUR50 to be paid during visa validation in France. For more details and latest procedure, please visit https://www.hongkong.campus-france.org/long-stay-student-visa-vls-ts-more-than-90-days

2 ORIENTATION ACTIVITIES

At NEOMA, an **International Welcome Day** was organized by the school before the semester starts. There is a welcoming talk introducing the campus, course registrations and student societies. After the orientation lunch, there was a campus tour, followed by some ice-breaking activities organized by Culture Connection.



3 INTERNATIONAL SERVICES AND ACTIVITIES

Culture Connection is a student organization at NEOMA which provides various activities for exchange students. They organize events and day trips every semester for international students in campus.

Besides, there is an **exchange buddy system** provided by the school. The system would match international students with a French local student as a buddy. It is a great way to learn more about French culture and adapt to the French lifestyle.

4 SOCIAL CLUBS AND NETWORKING OPPORTUNITIES

Apart from Culture Connection, there is a regional student club for international students called **Erasmus Fun**. It is considered to be a more popular society compared to Culture Connection due to more choices of day trips and cheaper fees. Besides, most exchange students would join their weekly party in Rouen downtown, you can meet some new friends from other universities over there and have fun.

5 ACCOMMODATIONS

On-campus accommodations are provided by the CROUS, which is separated from NEOMA. You could receive offers and guidelines in applying for CROUS accommodations from NEOMA via email, however you need to complete the application in the CROUS system.

For my semester, the following residences were offered:

I stayed in Ango 9m² for my semester, as it has a close distance to the campus and the bus stop of bus T1, with the cheapest rent. Although Bois is a newer building which is also closer to the campus, Ango is recommended as it is a building reserved for international students. Therefore, you can meet a lot of new friends living in the same residence and share great memories.



6 COURSES REGISTRATION

Course registration would be done before departure. The course catalogue would be released around April, where you could have a look at the courses offered in Rouen campus during the semester. In May, there is a pre-course registration session to choose between the set-schedule track or Mix & Match offer. If Mix & Match offer was chosen, a final course registration session will be held in June to select courses in the NEOMA system. The class schedule would be finalized after getting the approval from HKUST in the add-drop period in July.

Please note that GBBA Y1-3 courses cannot be selected together with GBBA Y4 and PGE courses.

7 TEACHING AND ASSESSMENT METHODS

During the semester, I have taken 4 courses in total – Strategic Marketing, Brand Management and Story Telling, Innovation Management, and Discovering and Understanding French Culture. With the new initiative of going digital, there were at least 1 remote session for all classes during the semester. **Attendance are required for all classes**, and valid justifications are needed for any absented sessions.

Regarding the assessments, all of them consist of continuous assessments, case study, and final exam / essay. The full score of each course is 20, and a score of 10 would be sufficient to get a pass.

8 SPORTS AND RECREATION FACILITIES

There is a gym operated by CROUS, which is near Bois building. A monthly fee is required to access the gym. You can also exercise and do some running along the jogging path near the campus and Ango.

9 FINANCE AND BANKING

In France, Euro is the official currency. Although I made most of my expenses with my HK debit card, it is important to **set up a French bank account for getting RIB** - a document that is used in different administrative tasks and collecting payments from different entities (e.g. CROUS, CAF, L'Assurance Maladie). BNP Paribas is the bank I used, and bank account opening can be done in campus in September.

10 CLIMATE

Due to a lower humidity compared to Hong Kong, the temperature is relatively warm in September to October. It is cold and rainy from mid-October to December. Layering is important and it is recommended to bring water-repellent jackets or coats along with warm clothes.

For pyjamas, since the heating system in Ango would be turned on in mid-September, the room would be quite warm to stay in. Wearing t-shirts would be fine in the residence.

11 HEALTH AND SAFETY

There are a few clinics around the campus. Appointments are usually required in advance, hence you could find the doctors and **make online reservations via Doctolib**.

To use the French National Health Insurance and its benefits, it is important to bring along with your **Carte Vitale** to visit the clinics and pharmacies. The Carte Vitale can be applied via L'Assurance Maladie after you have successfully applied for the National Health Insurance.

The area around the campus (Mont Saint Aignan) is a safe neighbourhood. However, it is still important to be aware of pickpockets and take good care of your belongings.

12 FOOD

Eating out in France is expensive. Hence, we usually do groceries and buy food from **Carrefour Market** or **Super U** nearby. I personally prefer Carrefour Market as there is a wider range of items at a reasonable price. The canteen at NEOMA also provides lunch at an affordable price, it would be a convenient choice for a quick meal before afternoon classes.



13 TRANSPORTATION

Within Rouen: You can take bus or metro within Rouen downtown and to Mont Saint Aignan. Common bus routes include F2, F7, F8 and T1. You can purchase single tickets or 10-journey youth tickets (JEUNE 10 voyages) at selected bus stops e.g. Campus, Place Colbert. It is recommended to purchase monthly bus card from Réseau Astuce which allows you to take unlimited rides within 30 days.

Within France: You can take Flixbus, Blablacar Bus or TER train to travel between Rouen and Paris. Buses would sometimes offer cheap tickets, while trains have a more frequent schedule. It is highly recommended to purchase Carte Avantage Jeune from SNCF, where you can get discounted train tickets at any time.

Other Countries: You can take **cross-border buses** (e.g. Flixbus), **planes** (e.g. easyjet) or **train** (e.g. SNCF). For flights, it is recommended to fly from and to Paris Orly or CDG airport, where there are direct buses and convenient transportations from and to Rouen.

14 COMMUNICATION

For mobile SIM card, I have subscribed to a EUR 13.99 plan from **Free Mobile** for 100GB 4G mobile data and 12GB data roaming in other European countries. Please note that **some European countries are not included in the roaming coverage list** (e.g. Switzerland).

For communication with local people, although you can communicate with English in campus, it is common that the French locals do not speak English. Therefore, I would suggest to **learn some basic French (e.g. using Duolingo) to handle some daily conversations before coming to France**.
