Stockholm School of Economics, Sweden

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Monthly Log

September:

In September, I arrived in Stockholm and received the keys to my housing at Saltis, which is the designated housing for exchange students. I participated in the orientation program at the Stockholm School of Economics, where I was able to learn more about the school, meet other exchange students, and get all of my administrative tasks taken care of. I was also introduced to the Exchange Student Committee (ESC) which is a student-run organization that helps exchange students to get settled in and make the most of their time in Stockholm. They organize events such as city tours, pub crawls, and other social events.

I also took the opportunity to experience the famous Swedish Fika culture by visiting some of the local cafes and trying traditional pastries.

Teaching & Assessment Methods

• No sports facilities on campus except a table-tennis table in basement.

Finance & Banking (including currency / expenses)

- SSE Advises not to open a bank account due to it being a long process
- Use credit cards from home country and make sure there isn't an international fee
- Use revolut

Health & Safety

- Extremely expensive for exchange students, make sure you have insurance
- Watch out for old lifts and loose windows, I was injured by both.

Food

- Only one small café in campus.
- All cuisines can be found in the city.
- Eating out is extremely expensive. Most exchange students cook and share their own food in the form of potlucks.

Transportation

• More expensive than Hong Kong transportation.

- Tickets are sold by the hour if it is single use ticket.
- Most exchange students rent bikes or buy month long passes for transportation.

Climate

- Negative temperatures in winter which results in snow (Extremely cold and extremely beautiful)
- Days become very short in winters (Sun from 8am 2pm)

Communication

- Sim cards are sold in almost all convenience stores
- Prices for plans are very comparable to Hong Kong.

Cautionary measures

- There is visible crime in the city.
- My bicycle was stolen and I saw a mugging happen in a park to a highschool student who had his shoes stolen.
- Lock your bike on stands in busy roads and lock the body and not just the wheel.
- Don't travel at night in shady roads/parks if you are wearing valuables.

Other notes (if applicable)

- Swedes love their work life balance and so most stores/restaurants will close and night.
- It is very rare to find a 24 hour convenience store and restaurants
- There are some restaurants (Mostly falafel/kebab restaurants and fast food) that stay open till 5am.

Checklist of items to bring:

- 1. Passport and visa (if applicable)
- 2. Travel insurance documents
- 3. Confirmation of accommodation and contact information for the housing provider
- 4. Cash and credit/debit cards
- 5. Phone and charger
- 6. Laptop or tablet and charger
- 7. Adaptor for electrical outlets
- 8. Warm clothing, including a coat, hat, scarf, and gloves
- 9. Comfortable walking shoes
- 10. Rain gear or umbrella
- 11. Prescription medication and copies of prescriptions
- 12. First aid kit
- 13. Toiletries and personal hygiene items
- 14. Study materials and textbooks for classes
- 15. Camera or smartphone for capturing memories
- 16. Any important documents or certificates, such as vaccination records or proof of enrollment.
- 17. Warm sleeping bag or blanket (if you are planning camping or hiking trips)
- 18. Winter boots, if you plan to go to Lapland to see northern lights
- 19. Warm thermal underwear and socks,
- 20. A refillable water bottle
- 21. Student ID, as well as any other identification required to access university resources.
- 22. International Student ID card
