I arrived Oslo on 18th August. The first impression towards Oslo was 'what a expensive city!'. I bought a coke which cost me around 30 HKD right after the landing.




And when I finally came back to Oslo to prepare for my finals, the city had turned into a winter wonderland!

### **GENERAL EXCHANGE INFO**

#### **Visa Procedures**

Apply your Visa ASAP at https://www.udi.no/ right after you have received the admission letter from BI. The f2f application process takes place in the Hong Kong office of VFS Global. The application will be sent to Royal Norwegian Embassy in Beijing to proceed. When you arrived Norway, make sure to make an appointment to the police station and apply for the residence card.

#### **Orientation Activities**

An exchange buddy group will be assigned to you before the school starts. A local student will contact you and guide you through the orientation week. There is also a Facebook group for exchange students with regular local experiences posted. Optional orientation activities are organised by BISO, a student organisation of BI. Some of the activities are free of charge but some are not. Register as BISO member can bring you some discounts. Belows are some orientation activities I have joined.




#### International Services & Activities

BI organises optional Norwegian language classes for exchange students at a discount price. You are welcome to join if you want to. Most Norwegians can speak really good English so I didn't join. You will learn a few fundamental Norwegian phrases if you hang out with locals.

#### Accommodation

BI Exchange students have three accommodation choices: the BSN, SiO and Diakonhjemmet. I picked SiO Kringsja student village as it is a more budget choice with stunning scenery. My friends and I were fortunate enough to see the northern lights in Sognsvann, a lake which is just a several minutes walk from our dorm. Although our dorm is not next to the campus, it only takes around 20 minutes of metro to commute from our dorm to BI. I like our dorm so much because there is a gym, a supermarket and we can have a lot of ad hoc activities to do such as campfire, picnic, or just a random walk in Sognsvann:) Will recommend SiO Kringsja if you want to experience the natural side of Norway on a daily basis.



#### **Courses Registration**

You will be sent the information for the course registration 1-2 months before the school starts. BI suggests you take a maximum of 4 courses. However, you can take more than that according to your own credit planning. Remember to apply the course mapping in HKUST ASAP once you have your study plan. Noted that the courses on credit transfer database may not be the exact courses you can take. You should refer to the course information sent by BI to conduct course mapping.

#### Teaching & Assessment Methods

All classes resumes to be f2f as the pandemic was over. The teaching style and class atmosphere in Norway is more relaxed and focus more on interactions. The courses I took are as follows:

#### **Sports & Recreation Facilities**

SiO offers gym membership for BI students. You can subscribe the monthly membership to enjoy gym facilities across several locations including the one on main campus and Kringsja Student Village. Monthly subscription is around 200 NOK. You have to cease your membership one month in advance

#### Finance & Banking

Norway is a cashless country so just prepare a debit/ credit card with better exchange rates. Remember to exchange some euros or pounds if you are planning to travel around Europe.

#### Social Clubs & Networking Opportunities

SiO organises activitess such as movie nights and other outdoor activities occasionally. Moreover, follow the instagram accounts of BISO and KROA(campus bar & cafe) for regular updates. There will be speed friending events, quiz nights, etc.

#### Health & Safety

Air quality in Norway is the best I have ever experienced for real so no worries about the air quality. I will advise you to bring more personal medicines even though there are some pharmacies across the city. I caught a flu in Norway and it's not something easy to go through because seeing a doctor is complicated if you are not a European citizen. So prepare for the worst!

#### Food

Food is super expensive as you may know Norway's price level is one of the highest in the world. We try to cook every meal as we can and we buy most of our groceries from supermarkets (KIWI, REMA1000, MENY, etc) and food market at Grønland.

#### Transportation

The mobile application, Ruter offers monthly pass and you will be able to go around the city through various transportations - bus/tram/metro/ ferries. Transportation to Airport requires an additional ticket which you can buy from Flytoget. There is no gate in metro station so undercover staffs will check your ticket occasionally.

#### Climate

It is cold and snowy in Norway but everywhere has indoor heating. For outdoor activities, gloves, a down jacket, non-slip boots for necessary for snowy seasons. Wear earmuffs for extra warmth if you plans to go somewhere norther.

#### Communication


Norwegians have a high literacy in English across different age groups so you can communicate with them easily. For phone and data service, I recommend buy a sim card before you arrive Norway or get a free sim from service provider like Giffgaff. Normally, these sim cards allows EU roaming around 10GB per month.

#### **Cautionary measures**

Slopes and roads are slippery when it's snowy. My friends fell on the same spot for three times on the same day. Get yourself a pair of boots with good grip. Overall, Norway is a safe country with good security and civilized citizens.
