December


I arrived at the Montréal-Trudeau International Airport at the end of December. I spent 4 days exploring the city alone.

General Exchange Information

Visa procedures

For Hong Kong passport holders, only eTA is required to enter Canada. Also, since the exchange period is shorter than 6 months, a study permit is not required.

Orientation activities

Smith School of Business held an orientation. There are talks introducing Kingston and Queen's University. We also had a campus tour. At night, we had dinner in the Goodes Hall which allowed us to chat with other exchange students. We also watched an ice hockey game after dinner.

International services and activities

Queen's University International Centre provided lots of supports to exchange students. They held orientations before the start of semester. During the semester, here are some classes such as English classes every week for exchange students

Accommodations

Since Smith School of Business did not provide any on campus housing, I found the off campus one. I lived in a house with another exchange student from Hong Kong and 3 domestic students.

Courses registration

Course registration was done on SOLUS. The system looks similar to SIS. Course ?? could be found online before enrollment. Course enrollment started in mid-October. Some courses have prerequisites and required the submission of relevant documents. Exchange students could enroll in 3 to 5 courses, at least 3 of them need to be commerce courses.

Finance and banking

I did not open a bank account in Canada, instead, I used the world debit card of HSBC. For people who wish to open a Canadian bank account, Scotiabank held a booth

Climate

The temperature in January and February is between -20°C to 5°C. In March, the weather become warmer. In late April, the temperature could be as high as 27°C.

Health and safety

All exchange students are required to join the University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP). Students can use walk-home service at night. There are some blue streetlights in the campus. If students want help from the securities, they can push the button, and someone will come immediately.

Food

For on-campus dining, there are some restaurants in ARC. For off-campus dining, there are many restaurants on Princesses Street. If you want to cook by yourself, you can visit the supermarkets, including Metro, Food Basics, No Frills, etc.

Transportation

Public transportation in Kingston is free when showing the student ID card. For traveling from other cities to Kingston, there are various choices, including VIA Rail, Flixbus, Megabus, etc.

Communication

Instead of buying sim card in Canada, I bought data cards in Hong Kong. It is much cheaper than joining plans in Canada.

Sports and recreation facilities

There is a gym room in the ARC which is free for Queen's students. There are also swimming pools, basketball courts, badminton courts in the campus.

Cautionary measures

There are two official languages in Canada, including English and French. Although English is the major language used in Kingston, some of the cities like Montreal use French more frequently.
